Division of Specialized Care for Children (DSCC)

"Serving Illinois Children with Special Health Care Needs"

Established in 1937

 DSCC is Illinois Title V agency for specialized treatment and rehabilitation of children with certain chronic physical disabilities and health impairments.



 The agency is administered by the University of Illinois at Chicago with Regional Offices throughout the state.

DSCC Care Coordination Teams



- Work with the family and health care professionals to help children with disabilities, and those who have conditions which may lead to disabilities, reach their full potential.
- Provide, promote and coordinate family centered, community-based care for eligible children with special health care needs.

DSCC Care Coordination Teams

DSCC serves children statewide through 11 Regional offices



What conditions are medically eligible for service?

A child must have a treatable chronic condition in one of the following categories:

- Orthopedic conditions (bone, muscle, joint disease)
- Heart defects
- Hearing loss
- Neurological conditions (nerve, brain, spinal cord)

Other DSCC Eligible Conditions:

- Cystic Fibrosis
- Eye Impairments
- Hemophilia
- Inborn Errors of Metabolism
- · Organic Speech Impairments
- Urinary Impairments
- External Body Impairments (cleft lip/palate, ear deformities, and many more)

DSCC only provides *specialized* medical care and services.

DSCC cannot provide help for:

- · Acute childhood illnesses or injuries
- · Routine dental care
- · Well-child care
- Immunizations
- School physical examinations
- Treatment which is experimental or investigational

Determining eligibility for DSCC services:

- The general application, financial forms and medical reports must be completed and reviewed by DSCC staff to determine DSCC eligibility.
- Must meet general eligibility: age, residency, citizenship
- If the child has an eligible medical condition, DSCC can provide care coordination services.
- If the family meets the financial eligibility criteria, DSCC can assist with payment for specialized medical treatment.

How does DSCC help if the child's diagnosis is unknown?

- Any Illinois child (birth to age 21) may qualify for a "no-cost" to family diagnostic evaluation if it is suspected that a DSCC eligible medical condition exists.
- DSCC will arrange a diagnostic evaluation to determine if the child has an eligible medical condition.
- DSCC will also support diagnostic evaluation for newborns who are referred following newborn screening

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Care Coordination - If the child has an eligible

medical condition, we will:

- Provide a family centered approach through care coordination teams
- Facilitate communication between family and providers
- · Advocate for families across settings
- Provide information about medical conditions, local resources, and transition planning

Care Coordination - Transition Planning

Helping families and youth:

- · Plan for the future
- Build independence skills
- Learn about the options for finances, health care, self-care, education, living arrangements, social/recreational activities, employment/vocational training.

Care Coordination and Medical

Home

- The PCP is available to the family when needed
- Considers the whole family's needs as they impact the child
- Coordinates care for all services: info about, and referrals to community resources, referrals to other specialists
- Treats the family as an equal partner and decision maker

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Care Coordination and Medical Home

DSCC works to strengthen the family/PCP/DSCC relationship by:

- Raising families' awareness about MH relationship
- Raising PCP's awareness of DSCC services and Medical Home approach
- Working with Quality Improvement Teams to increase "Medical Homeness"

Care Coordination: We Can Help!

DSCC Care Coordination staff are:

- Nurses
- Social Workers
- Audiologists
- Speech- Language Pathologists
- Program Coordinator Assistants

How does DSCC help financially eligible children?

- Assists families to maximize insurance and other resources
- DSCC: Application Agent for AllKids, requires/assists families to use AllKids
- · Assists with insurance co-pays
- · Serves as payor of last resort
- Reimburses for transportation/lodging to help increase access to medical care
- Provides care coordination to minimize duplicative services

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How does DSCC help financially eligible children?

Provides financial support and assistance in obtaining medical services, such as:

- Specialty physicians
- Therapy services (OT, PT, Speech)
- Hospitalizations
- Audiology services

How does DSCC help financially eligible children?

Provides financial support and assistance in obtaining medical equipment, such as:

- Braces and splints
- Hearing aids
- Wheelchairs
- Ramps and lifts
- Medical supplies
